1. Name of country: Mexico

2. Copyright and related rights legislation:

<u>Federal Copyright Law</u>: The copyright legal system in Mexico derives from article 28 of the Federal Constitution is the Federal Copyright Law, which was enacted on 24 December 1996 and took effect as of 24 March 1997, is the main statutory law governing copyright and related rights.

<u>Regulations under The Federal Copyright Law:</u> This instrument was created to regulate the provisions of the Federal Copyright Law and its implementation for administrative effects, the responsibility of the Ministry of Culture through the National Copyright Institute and in some cases, of the Mexican Industrial Property Institute, also states that the provisions of international treaties concluded and ratified by Mexico would be respected.

4. Name of the Government Department(s)

National Copyright Institute (Ministry of Culture) and the Mexican Institute of Industrial Property (Ministry of Economy).

The National Copyright Institute is the competent authority to enforce copyright for cases in which the conduct is not intended to obtain a profit with the use of a work and in those infringement related to omissions in observing certain obligations foreseen in the Federal Copyright Law. For cases in which the infringement constitutes conduct focused on obtaining direct or indirect profits, the competent authority to take action against the alleged infringer is the Mexican Institute of Industrial Property.

5. Names of collective management organizations representing or administering the rights of owners of copyright or related rights in your country, the rights which they manage or license and the types of right holders they represent. If possible provide links to their websites.

Collective management organizations in Mexico manage copyrights and related rights on behalf of their members, protecting national or foreign authors and collecting and delivering the royalties derived from the use of their works or performances.

It is important to note that pursuant to the Federal Copyright Law, authors and performers have the non-waivable remuneration right to collect royalties for the public use and communication of their works or performances. Collective management organizations may grant licenses for the use of works or performances to third parties.
