WIPO Standing Committee on Copyright and Related Rights 26th Session Suggestions for an appropriate International Legal Instrument (in whatever form) on exceptions and limitations for Libraries and Archives

Statement from the British Copyright Council

In considering exceptions applicable to libraries and archives, it is important to be clear about the nature and extent of an institution which can properly be described as a "library" or "archive" relevant to the debate.

In an increasingly online world, the services that may be provided by bodies that are in whole or in part "libraries" or "archives" are increasingly comparable to services that are provided by bodies which would not be regarded, in the traditional sense, as a "library" or an "archive".

Therefore economic concerns arise if copyright provisions which apply to the use of copyright works within the services provided by libraries and archives effectively remove or replace important opportunities for creators and investors in copyright works to secure a fair reward for the use of their works.

That is not a challenge to the public value of the important services that are supported by the existence of libraries and archives within the defined limits.

However, in this debate, it is vital to recognise the current balanced and flexible provision for exceptions and limitations, including licensing options, within existing International Copyright Treaties which already service the diverse cultural and public service requirements of individual WIPO Member States.

It is to be hoped that this fundamental framework is not forgotten as any debate for a further Instrument relating to the topic of libraries and archives, is taken forward.
